I've been an advocate, an activist, and a protester, since I was born. Every person is a politician, as we as educators, parents and union members advocate every day of our lives whether it be in our kāinga (homes), in our workplaces, our communities or on the marae.

I am currently the Kaihautu for Te Waipounamu and hold a General seat on National Executive alongside Te Areare which makes up Te Kahu Kiwi.
